

# **Moor Boots**

Heading	Content									
Summary	Moor Boots is a scheme to assist young people from disadvantaged backgrounds to acquire personal expedition equipment allowing them to participate in activities from which they would otherwise be barred.									
Project description	The scheme will make small grants to selected individuals allowing them to purchase personal items such as boots and socks from selected suppliers. The scheme is targeted at the Duke of Edinburgh Award (D of E) scheme, and removing cost barriers to entry of the D of E scheme for disadvantaged young people.									
	Some people are prevented from taking part in these activities because they are unable to acquire suitable equipment. Whilst some items of communal equipment like tents can be provided by organisers, items of personal equipment have to be funded by the participants. Boots, in particular are very difficult to share because of different sizes, fit and foot shapes.									

Potential applicants for grants will be identified by D of E Assessors / supervising teachers. Each applicant will complete a simple application form which will be accompanied by a supporting statement from the teacher / assessor. Applications will be adjudicated by an independent panel. Successful applicants will purchase equipment from designated participating suppliers.

The type of equipment that will be sponsored will vary from one individual to another. A young person "experimenting" with D of E expedition activity would not be provided with the same quality of equipment as an experienced applicant undertaking the Gold stage of the Award. There are a number of reasons for this:

- More experienced applicants will be undertaking tougher challenges that may require better equipment.
- Boots purchased for younger applicants are unlikely to be suitable for more than one season.
- Outcomes will be more uncertain where equipment is purchased for inexperienced applicants.

The D of E Award scheme provides an opportunity for young people to experience and learn about the Dartmoor landscape in an environment that places high value on developing teamwork skills and understanding the heritage and natural environment of the landscape.

# Beneficiaries and communication

The direct beneficiaries are the young people who are successful applicants to the scheme.

### Key message

This project is about assisting young people from disadvantaged background so that they can participate in active involvement with Dartmoor and it landscape

#### **Communications**

Communication between applicants and the DPA will be via D of E leaders.

The project will be supported by the MTMTE website which will be updated regularly

### Project buy-in

The fact that young people are sometimes unable to participate in the DofE scheme because they cannot afford the equipment came to light during informal discussions with teachers / assessors. When the DPA offered to provide funds to help with this it was welcomed by the relevant school. Further discussions with DNPA and with the Devon area organiser for DofE have provided further support for the idea. DPA trustees have committed to providing funds over the 5 year period of the MTMTE period.

	During the first year of the scheme a further five active DofE organisations will be identified and invited to join the scheme. Suppliers will also be approached with a view to securing preferential discounts and a simple coupon scheme for grant redemption.
Project development	This is a new project which was proposed during the development phase of the scheme.
	A pilot scheme, involving Westlands School in Torbay, is in development at the moment. The pilot will provide support for a couple of applicants from the school as well as being the test bed for mechanisms for the scheme as a whole (application process, adjudication, supplier negotiations etc).
	Additional schools and organisations will be invited to join the scheme in year one. In order to prevent the scheme being swamped by applications, participation will be by invitation. Within the MTMTE area there is only one school that operates a D of E scheme, South Dartmoor Community College. It is anticipated that if full funding is available, there will be grants for about 10 to 20 young people each year and that this level of demand would be generated between 6 to 8 participating organisations.
	Equipment suppliers will be approached to provide preferential discounts to successful candidates. It is hoped that a simple scheme can be developed whereby grant allocations can be redeemed against some form of coupon. In the pilot phase only two suppliers will be used and experience gained with these suppliers will be used to further develop the scheme.
	The adjudicating panel will be appointed by the trustees of the DPA. It is anticipated that some grant beneficiaries will be invited to join the panel from the second year of the scheme.
Activities and Timetable	The scheme will operate as a cyclical process on a yearly basis. The DoE expedition season runs during British Summer Time (ie March to October). The yearly calendar will therefore runs as follows:  September / October / November/December Review and assess performance of the scheme over the previous period involving grant beneficiaries, assessors / teachers and other participating organisations (eg suppliers). Revise application forms, guidance notes and other documentation in light of review. Identify and invite additional organisations to join the scheme if funds permit.

Outcomes	More people and a wider range of people will have engaged with heritage Young people from socially disadvantaged backgrounds will not be prevented from experiencing the Dartmoor landscape through inability to afford personal equipment.
Evidence	Through the application process and ongoing evaluation and monitoring of the MTMTE scheme we will be able to see if the grant scheme is helping those who need it most to get out to Dartmoor and experience the rich natural heritage of the moor as part of a D of E award.

It is estimated that 1 in 7 young people between the ages of 10 to 19 lives in the top 10% most deprived areas of England.
