		A summary of the Projects' progress and Red/Amber/Green (RAG) status is in Appendix A. As in the last quarter, this has been expanded to show key actions and milestones Project Leads are recommended to take to address issues on their projects and return individual performance measures back to/towards 'Green'.
		The Y4Q1 HLF Request for Payment (Claim) and Progress Report were submitted on 16 and 17 January respectively for £131,202 (Y4Q1 expenditure totalled £265,385) with payment due by 21 February. There were no queries over the submissions and HLF payment was received on 21 February.
		The Y4Q2 HLF Request for Payment (Claim) and Progress Report were submitted on 22 and 23 March respectively for £58,057 (Y4Q2 expenditure totalled £117,433) with payment due by 21 April. The forecast expenditure for the period from Project Leads totalled £282k (so we claimed -£165k, -58%).
		Given the similar variance on Project Leads' forecasts last quarter (-£180k, -59%) this again highlights the need for more accurate forecasting so that we have an accurate cashflow position. This is more pressing given the remaining six quarters to deliver our Projects (we'll be half-way through Y4Q3 at the time of reading this report), approaching the 10% retention trigger and resultant impact on managing our cashflow and onward partner payments.
		Overall Scheme expenditure to 28 February 2018 is £2.519m (excluding ~£19k unbudgeted costs to date, captured under PE7). This is £729k behind the £3.350m originally planned at bid stage (-22%), and is worse than last quarter.
		There is continued pressure to complete our Projects and their spend over the remaining six quarters of the Scheme to ensure we utilise the entire grant available. Delivering the PB1 – Bellever and Postbridge Trails, PC1 – Dartmoor Story and PC8 – Postbridge Visitor Centre projects will play key roles in this with £106k, £111k and £178k remaining respectively.
		We successfully negotiated HLF approval of the majority of new Projects and re-scoped elements of existing Projects following Board's approval on 24 January – these are further detailed under the Scope section below.
		Nine events and activities were organised and delivered in the quarter across a range of audiences, themes and venues. These included:

		This quarter saw another excellent contribution from the volunteering sector having secured the equivalent of £44k contribution (£7k claimable) through the PB2, PB4, PB7 and PC4 projects. The Scheme has a £114k target for volunteering input (equivalent to 2,280 'unskilled' days). We exceeded this target in 2016 and our volunteers have already kindly given: 2,233 'Unskilled', 1,254 'Skilled' and 88 'Professional' days, equivalent to almost £331k in contributions.
		£90k of this has been earnt on eligible Projects and we are well on our way to meet the Scheme's £114k claimable target. Two projects remain key to helping us meet this target with ~£10k and £8k contributions respectively outstanding and planned for each:
		PA1 – Moorland Birds
		PB4 – Engaging with the nature of the Bovey Valley
		Over the past six months, we have been developing a plan of key activities responding to the Interim Monitoring & Evaluation Report recommendations and as set out in Appendix C. We have already completed some actions (shown with a tick) and have organised a formal workshop looking at Legacy Planning on 9 May. The draft Scheme Legacy Plan has been collated based on the Scheme and Project Legacy aspirations at the bid stage (see Appendix F). This is a live working document and a starting point for discussions at the workshop.
		As part of the Recommendations implementation and following the Scheme's Communications Strategy approval January's Board meeting, we asked Project Leads to contribute to the Scheme's Communications Plan this quarter and we have collated this to show our collective planned communication opportunities and activities in Appendix D. Overall the response was disappointing with many projects not identifying any opportunities through their remaining delivery. This continues to highlight the challenges we face in publicising the Scheme, the work of our Projects and Partners and ultimately HLF acknowledgement of their investment.
		The central Scheme Team's communications continue, particularly on social media and in print this quarter. Our <a href="mailto:@Dartmoor_MTMTE">@Dartmoor_MTMTE</a> Twitter account has 670 followers (+40% since last quarter) with our tweets being seen over 67,000 times over the last three months, or 749 times/day. This is despite the Christmas break and more limited activity generally.
		Facebook coverage continues in parallel with Twitter and we have grown to 828 followers (+2%) over the quarter on <a href="mailto:@moorthanmeetstheeye">@moorthanmeetstheeye</a> . Our light-hearted <a href="Discovering the Dartmoor Story Bronze Age">Discovering the Dartmoor Story Bronze Age</a> video has received some 2,200 views and fantastic feedback on Facebook and

		HLF acknowledged and were pleased with our communications activities at our 8 February progress meeting, highlighting the importance of continued social media activity.
		The winter Dartmoor Magazine issue (12,000 readership) featured a 2-page spread on <i>MTMTE</i> and the Tavy/Oke and MoorLinks magazines (58,000 readership) ran a two-edition feature on MTMTE's work. A selection of media coverage has been compiled and is on shown in the folder in the Meeting Room, Parke.
		Finally, we have a new HLF Grant Officer, Vicky Allott, following Claire Hynes' departure. I am trying to arrange a meeting with Vicky to brief her on the Scheme before we formally meet at the next HLF Monitoring Meeting in May.
		On balance, I have judged the overall direction of travel to be better from last quarter, primarily reflecting approval of new and re-scoped projects.

		The Scheme is 70% complete by time and a simple pro-rata spend indicator would suggest that we are in a similar position to last quarter at slightly behind schedule by £171k (~5%), in terms of Earned Value.
		Five projects have forecasted costs after the Scheme's final quarter in Y5Q4 (Jun-Aug 2019), suggesting slippage in their delivery. These are:
		<ul> <li>PA5 – Unveiling the heritage of the High Moor and Forests (£8k)</li> <li>PA6 – Higher Uppacott (£500)</li> </ul>
		PA8 – Ancient Boundaries Modern farming (£10k)
		PB6 – Managing Volunteers (£310)
		PD4 – Heritage Skills Training (£10k)      PD5 – Consequentian Angus prices (COL)
		PD5 – Conservation Apprentices (£8k)
		However, I suspect that these are forecasting errors and not genuine delays in Project delivery. The current PD4 and PD5 underspends are predominantly related to later than expected staff appointments and a plan of what to do with these underspends needs to be established (probable extension of training opportunities, subject to capacity to organise these within the time remaining).
		Whilst the Scheme technically ends on 31 December 2019, our Projects have always been scheduled for delivery by the end of August 2019 (Y5Q4). This aligns with the HLF reporting period and provides some 4 months to evaluate and close projects. It also reflects the skeletal core team that will still be in post at the end to administer and close the Scheme, securing the 10% retention from the HLF.

		Despite a revised proposal being approved by Board in January, progress on <i>PC8 – Postbridge Visitor Centre</i> has been limited. This has been mainly due to potential funding becoming available again to allow a full rebuild of the centre. We discussed this with HLF at the 8 February Monitoring Meeting and they indicated that inclusion of the round house would be fundamental to receiving HLF support and that funding would have to be drawn down by March 2020 at the latest. DNPA's Leadership Team has scheduled an Emergency Meeting to discuss the next steps and will provide an update at the Board meeting. DNPA has been developing an interpretation brief to procure design support in the meantime.

		We received HLF approval of a significant number of Project changes this quarter – as detailed in the 'Scope' section.
		Generally, the envisaged quality of the Project Outputs, Outcomes and Benefits, and so the Scheme overall, remain unchanged.

		Following the significant variance from Project Leads' forecast in Y4Q1, this trend continued this quarter (-£165k, -58%) and mainly stemmed from underspends on the following projects:  • PA4 – Discovering the Nature of the Bovey Valley (-£25k, -93%) No reporting or claim was received from Natural England for their elements of the project • PA5 - Unveiling the heritage of the High Moor and Forests (-£18k, -98%) Reporting costs were expected this quarter and do not appear to have been received. The Project Lead needs to reforecast these (if still expected) in the appropriate quarter from Y4Q3, as the Project shows a significant forecast underspend overall despite being rescoped in Y4Q1.  • PB1 – Bellever & Postbridge Trails (-£29k, -85%) Costs have not materialised as planned over the last 6 months, partly impacted by association with PC8 – Postbridge Visitor Centre  • PB5 – Welcome to Widecombe (-£6k, -100%) Delayed progression of village trail booklet  • PB7 – In the footsteps of the Victorians (-£14k, -33%) Lower than expected RAMM staff costs received in the quarter. These are now expected in Y4Q3  • PC1 – Discovering the Dartmoor Story (-£37k, 90%) We are £729k (22%) behind our Scheme bid forecast in terms of spend to

		Budget reallocation to the 'PD6 - Dart Valley in Focus' project aiming to develop young people's skills and understanding of Dartmoor's special qualities and its contested landscape through films and a programme of on-site events and activities for families to promote heritage.
		The scope of <i>PC8 – Postbridge Visitor Centre</i> remains uncertain following new funding opportunity being identified on 8 February 2018. HLF feedback on the proposal approved by Board on 24 January 2018 was that the round house needed to form a fundamental part of any forthcoming proposal.
		As PC8 – Postbridge Visitor Centre forms the centrepiece of the Scheme's cultural engagement (and of the DNPA's visitor strategy), and is a relatively large project for the Scheme in its own right, I have judged the overall scope to be at Amber status, despite the large number of changes successfully agreed with HLF in the last quarter.

		Following HLF approval of key Project changes and re-scoping requests in the last quarter, the quality of our Projects and the Scheme overall aligns with the outcomes and our Approved Purposes.
		Inclusion of the new PD6 – Dart Valley in Focus project (largely replacing PD3 – East Shallowford) broadens our audience reach, the breadth of our Projects being delivered and specifically targets historically hard to engage groups.

		The Scheme's top ten risks by notional monetary impact are shown in the Quantified Risk Register (QRR) in Appendix B. The QRR currently totals £285k (7% of the £3.843m Scheme budget) and is slightly up on last


