		A summary of the Projects' progress and Red/Amber/Green (RAG) status is in Appendix A.
		The Y4Q3 HLF Request for Payment (Claim) and Progress Report were submitted on 22 June for £60,337 (Y4Q3 expenditure totalled £122,046) with payment due by 21 July. Payment was received on 26 June for £62,357 as none of our adjustments requested in Y4Q2 and Y4Q3 had been processed by HLF.
		The Y4Q4 HLF Request for Payment (Claim) and Progress Report were submitted on 21 September for £65,730, including the previously requested adjustments, with payment due by 21 October (Y4Q4 claimable expenditure totalled £143,648). The forecast expenditure for the period from Project Leads totalled £221k (so we claimed -£78k, -36%).
		This is the fourth quarter in a row where we have had significant variance on Project Leads' forecasts (-£180k, -59%, -£165k, -58% -£105k, -54% and £-78k, -36% this quarter). This is obviously an unsustainable position, particularly given the final four quarters remaining until the Scheme ends. I expect this trend to improve in Y5Q1 following the recent project reviews with all our Project Leads, where the need for greater forecasting accuracy was stressed. Further detail and commentary on the main potential reasons for this is given in the 'Costs' section below.
		Overall Scheme expenditure to 31 Aug 2018 is £2.874m (excluding ~£8k unbudgeted costs to date, captured under PE7; the remaining costs original captured under this heading have been transferred back to their respective Project codes to capture their true outturn costs). This is £671k behind the £3.545m originally planned at bid stage (-19%), and slightly better than last quarter.
		There is continued pressure to complete our Projects and their spend over the remaining four quarters of the Scheme to ensure we utilise the entire grant available. Delivering the <i>PB1 – Bellever and Postbridge Trails</i> (slow progress and £104k remaining, with £15k forecast underspend), and <i>PC8 – Postbridge Visitor Centre</i> (slow progress, decreasing time, £178k remaining budget with £58k forecast underspend) projects will play key roles in this.
		HLF will be withholding the final 10% of our £1.9m grant until they are satisfied that all of their requirements have been fulfilled. This includes providing an evaluation report, acknowledgement of our funding and images as part of the final claim (due for submission on 21 September 2019). HLF will withhold the final 10% when our total eligible Scheme costs reach £3,458,865, currently forecast to be in Y5Q3 (Mar-May 2019).

## Measure **RAG Direction of travel** This will leave the Scheme's Common Fund without income to pay the 14 projects with forecast costs currently in Y5Q4 or beyond (4 projects). More detail is provided on this in the Costs section and in Appendix B. 29 events and activities were organised and delivered in the quarter across a range of audiences, themes and venues – attracting some 1,100 people. These included: John Muir Award workshops in schools the North Hall Manor community excavation as part of the PB5 -Welcome to Widecombe project • a programme of Medieval walks and talks as part of the North Hall Manor community excavation, and various Wildlife events around the Dart and Bovey rivers. This quarter saw another excellent contribution from the volunteering sector having secured the equivalent of £29k contribution (£9k claimable) through the PA1, PB2, PB4, PB7 and PC4 projects. The Scheme has a £114k target for volunteering input (equivalent to 2,280 'unskilled' days). We exceeded this target in 2016 and our volunteers have already kindly given: 2,384 'Unskilled', 1,621 'Skilled' and 92 'Professional' days, equivalent to £395k in contributions. £104k of this has been earnt on eligible Projects and we are well on our way to meet the Scheme's £114k claimable target. The PA1 – Moorland *Birds* project remains the key contributor to achieving this. We held a Legacy Working Group on 5 September to review progress on developing our Legacy Overview and detailed Plan. Our work pulling together the various sources of information and aspirations for the Scheme's Legacy has been hampered by few contributions from Partners to the review of their bid stage aspirations and future intentions/commitments. The updated draft Legacy Overview and Plan is shown in Appendix F. The Scheme's updated Communications Plan showing our collective planned communication opportunities and activities is in Appendix D. Overall the response still remains disappointing with 14 projects (47%) not identifying any opportunities through their remaining delivery. This continues to highlight the challenges we face in publicising the Scheme, the work of our Projects and Partners and ultimately HLF acknowledgement of their investment. More of our Projects' Outputs have either been completed this last quarter. or are progressing; reducing the number we are concerned about. A summary and supporting commentary is provided in Appendix E. The central Scheme Team's communications continue, mainly on social media this quarter and have seen significant growth on our main Twitter and Facebook channels. Our <a>@Dartmoor\_MTMTE</a> Twitter account has

		740 followers (+5.7% since last quarter) with our tweets being seen over 85,000 times over the last three months, or 924 times/day (-4%). This is particularly encouraging, despite limited tweeting from the core staff team for a third of the quarter (due to staff leave over August) and some errors in the tweet handles and hashtags in partners' tweets (reducing potential exposure/publicity). 		Facebook coverage continues in parallel with Twitter and we have grown to 1,030 followers (+10%) and 879 'likes' (+13%) over the quarter on <a href="mailto:@moorthanmeetstheeye">@moorthanmeetstheeye</a> .
		A selection of media coverage has been compiled and is shown in the folder in the Meeting Room, Parke and has included articles in the local and regional press, including Dartmoor Matters, Dartmoor News, Dartmoor Magazine, Princetown Times, Tavistock Times Gazette and on BBC Spotlight; although editors do not always acknowledge <i>MTMTE</i> or HLF.
		On balance, I have judged the overall direction of travel to be worse from last quarter, primarily reflecting the increased number of projects experiencing delays in their delivery (and the associated delay in costs being claimed) and confirmation of two major forecast project underspends.
Schedule	Amber	Worse
		Whilst the Scheme technically ends on 31 December 2019, our Projects have always been scheduled for delivery by the end of August 2019 (Y5Q4); 5 years since HLF's 'Permission to Start'. This aligns with the HLF reporting period and provides some 4 months to evaluate and close projects and the Scheme. It also reflects the skeletal core team that will still be in post at the end to administer and close the Scheme, securing the 10% retention from the HLF.
		The Scheme is 80% complete by time and a simple pro-rata spend indicator would suggest that we are slightly worse than last quarter and slightly behind schedule by £200k (~5%), in terms of Earned Value.
		Following our review meetings and Project Leads' revised forecasts submitted as part of their Y4Q4 reporting, 15 Projects are now expecting some of their costs to fall in the last quarter of the Scheme (Jun-Aug 2019), an increase from just three last quarter, totalling £109k. Not only does this increase the risk associated with ensuring these are completed by the end of the Scheme, but also delays the resultant benefits of their projects being realised, and minimises evidence on which to base their evaluation of their projects' (and the Scheme's) effectiveness overall.
		Four projects also have forecasted costs after the Scheme's final quarter in Y5Q4 (Jun-Aug 2019), suggesting slippage in their delivery. These are:

		The other £44k forecast costs after Scheme completion are associated with staff overheads in Programme E. These are not delays to the Schedule, just true costs of completing the Scheme's Final Monitoring & Evaluation and administration until final closure.			
		Although it carries no outstanding financial commitment to securing the Scheme's HLF grant, completing the <i>PC5 – Wray Valley Trail</i> project remains critical in terms of Schedule to ensure that we deliver the outcomes and benefits of the investment.

		Generally, the envisaged quality of the Project Outputs, Outcomes and Benefits, and so the Scheme overall, remain unchanged.

		Following the significant variance from Project Leads' forecasts in the last three quarters, this trend continued again this quarter (-£78k, -36%), albeit to a slightly lower variance. This mainly stemmed from significant underspends on the following projects:

		Approximately -£9k is associated with delayed video procurement by DNPA, which is now expected from Y5Q1. The remaining underspend is associated with delays delivering the Woodland

		We are -£671k (-19%) behind our Scheme bid forecast in terms of spend to this quarter; although the comparison against the more recent Y4 forecast is worse at -£365k (-36%).
		Hopefully, Project Leads' updated forecasts in the Y4Q4 reporting, following the project reviews, will be more accurate and provide greater confidence over the final year. We will be able to see how accurate this has been when the Y5Q1 claim is processed in December.
		Two projects confirmed significant forecast underspends as part of the recent project reviews:
		<ul> <li>PC8 – Postbridge Visitor Centre Interpretation (-£58k, -31%)         A budget of £120 has been allocated to procuring an external designer to deliver the centre's interpretation. This has resulted in a confirmed £58k underspend which DNPA has no planned use for     </li> <li>PC1 – Bellever &amp; Postbridge Trails (-£15k, -12%)         The remaining works and interpretation currently being procured will result in a £15k underspend on the project which DNPA has no     </li> </ul>
		planned use for.
		As a result, I currently forecast the Scheme to be ~£400k underspent at completion if the same quarterly 'under-claiming' trend continues and PC1 and PC8 budget cannot be reallocated. This would result in a loss of £198k HLF grant funding.
		Partners are asked to discuss potential reallocation of this funding and consider the options referred to in Item 60.
		A significant number of projects now have costs forecast slipping into the Scheme's final quarter. The 14 projects (excluding Programme E – Scheme Overheads) with forecast costs currently in Y5Q4 or beyond (5 projects) are shown in Appendix B. This further increases the risk of the Scheme not drawing down HLF grant funding should these projects be
		delayed further. Project Leads should do all in their power to accelerate

		The scope of the <i>PC8 – Postbridge Visitor Centre (Interpretation</i> ) project has now been confirmed through the issue of the Invitation to Tender. HLF has agreed to the deletion of roundhouse provision.
		The remaining scope of <i>PB1 Bellever &amp; Postbridge Trails</i> has also been confirmed with a similar Invitation to Tender for the wider interpretation works.
		Both projects are expected to award their contracts in Y5Q1 and deliver by the end of the Scheme.

		The benefits of our Projects and the Scheme overall aligns with the expected outcomes and our Approved Purposes.

		The Scheme's top ten risks by notional monetary impact are shown in the Quantified Risk Register (QRR) in Appendix C. The QRR currently totals £348k (9% of the £3.843m Scheme budget) and is comparable to last quarter.
		The QRR is a live document throughout the course of the Scheme and will be influenced by the Projects' individual risks as they change.


