The trail will bring back to life the route of the branch line constructed by the Victorians, whilst sympathetically maintaining the habitat of wildlife along the route. The scheme will increase access to and learning opportunities about the local landscape and its heritage.
The scheme will deliver 6km of multi-use trail on a mixture of green fields, disused railway line and existing highway links for use by all
LP outcomes for heritage. Heritage will be better managed and identified and recorded.  LP outcomes for people. People will have learnt about heritage.
LP outcomes for communities. More people and a wider range of people will have engaged with heritage and the local area / community will be a better place to live, work or visit.
The route will be open for use by the public with interpretation boards detailing the heritage of the railway.  Usage numbers will be recorded by DCC.
