Summary	To develop an interactive web based map to develop, promote and share a range of Heritage Trails which help people explore and learn about the area.							
Project description	To develop a new interactive web based map. The map will include layers, which can be switched on or off, to show natural and historic features; local accommodation, pubs, cafes etc; access land and public rights of way. To make this map as user friendly and attractive as possible it will display a range of pre planned routes themed to the chapters of the Dartmoor Story. The pre-planned routes will provide for a range of ability providing a challenge and sense of exploration for all by linking heritage sites. There will be a range of routes for walkers and cyclists. The map will also allow people to plan their own route using the layers of information above to discover heritage they are interested in and upload this onto the website to share with others.							

	Although this map will be hosted by the NPA there can be a clean link direct to both the Moor then meets the eye website and the Dartmoor Partnership websites.					
	There will also be the need for a leaflet to promote the map.

Project development	The original scheme included a proposal for one Heritage Trail. Discussion with stakeholders such as Dartmoor Farmers, Dartmoor Partnership, D of E leaders and Ten Tors team leaders suggested that the interactive map based approach would be more sustainable; allow for routes catering for different taste and ability; enable visitors to plan and share their own routes and spread the distribution and benefit across a wider area.					
	The new proposal will allow for routes to be developed and graded for different abilities – shorter routes for families, weekend routes, routes for					

	people with special needs, challenge routes. It will also allow for routes on bicycle and on foot.
	Ten Tors teams and D of E groups will be invited to submit routes as part of their training on Dartmoor – we hope this will encourage more teenagers to explore, learn about and appreciate Dartmoor.
	The approach will also link with other projects in the scheme by allowing people to input data they have collected on wildlife sightings, initially moorland birds.
	The new project will also provide the opportunity to improve accessibility of the Dartmoor HER to a wider audience. This will to allow "clean" and user friendly information to be included as a dataset to the map and will explain in simple terms each of the heritage sites. The Dartmoor HER project ends on 31 March 2014 and it is unlikely that the officers will be employed at the same levels as they are currently due to withdraw of EH funding and extreme pressure on DNPA funding. Included in this bid is time for officers to make appropriate changes to the HER for sites close to the access land/routes in the moor than meets the eye area.
	Originally this project was estimated at £75,000
